Introduction to Comparative Politics

Course description: Comparative politics is one of the major subfields in political science and focuses on examining phenomena such as civil conflict, elections, and institutional capabilities and responses. This course will pride students with an overview of the world's political and governmental systems, as well as methods typically employed in the subfield. Primary focus will be in exploring the variation in governmental institutions of governments around the world to modern phenomena. These differences in institutions may lead to differing policy outcomes as well derive from differing citizenstate relationships.

Upon successful completion of the course, it is expected that the student should be able to understand the differences in economic development, civil society, political culture, and political behavior. Students should also have a thorough foundation of difference in electoral systems, forms of government, synthesize major themes of comparative politics.

ATTENDANCE: It is imperative, and <u>required</u>, that you log-on a <u>minimum</u> of twice per week. Just as attendance is required in a traditional classroom, attendance is key to the learning experience online as well. To facilitate collegiality and discussion, students are required to log/on and post twice a week during weeks where a blog assignment is due, <u>once before midnight on Tuesday of each week</u>, and once after Wednesday 8am and before midnight Saturday of each week. You may post more than this is you like

but not less as these are graded discussion lines. If you post twice in a week, fulfilling the minimal requirements of posting, but both take place in the former or later part of the week, you will **NOT** have fulfilled the requirement. Please see the section on Discussion section for more detailed information on the nature and requirements of your posts.

Logging on and checking email:

Students are required to log on twice per week into their email accounts as well as the D2L portal. As entrance into the portals are date and time stamped, the instructor will be able to track student attendance and ensure students are progressing appropriately. Frequent logging in is key as announcements regarding grades, due dates, IT issues, exam results problems will be updated frequently and it is the student's lone responsibility to ensure he/she is fully updated at all times. On weeks where assessments are due, each student MUST log-in no later than 24 hours after the exam to see if there is any communication from the instructor regarding any submission issues! This is required and students will not receive extended deadlines or additional opportunities to resubmit their quiz because they failed to check their email or the portals within the 24 hour time period. This is explained in more detail in the Assessments section.

The only email account allowed for this class is the SIU email account. The instructor will not receive nor respond to emails from private accounts to ensure clear channels of communication. It is each student's responsibility to follow these attendance/email policies properly. Any student who fails to follow these policies will not, under <u>any</u> <u>circumstances</u>, be given additional opportunities, extended deadlines, or any other grade recourse.

Please make sure to adjust your expectations accordingly.

Lectures:

Lectures are intended to expand upon and explain the readings in the course and common themes, methods, and discussions had within the comparative field. There will never be

more than five lectures scheduled per week. Lectures are a combination of video captures and powerpoints and as such students will need to be able to play videos via whichever internet platform you use and have access to Microsoft Powerpoint. Videos will be posted every Wednesday and Friday by noon and are intended to address areas the instructor believes need clarification or extra exploration from that provided in the textbook. As noted in the announcement on the D2L shell on 9/12, students will only be responsible for the lecture materials on the midterm and final exam. Lecture materials will cross over terms, concepts, and topics within the textbook but for quizzes, only the textbook materials will be utilized within the quizzes.

DISCUSSIONS: The Discussion section is your classroom. It is where the students and instructor are able to interact between one another and learn from each other's ideas. As such, it is a forum of academic freedom but there is E-Etiquette that must be maintained. Use of coarse, foul, aggressive, or inappropriate language is strictly prohibited. Harassment of, or a verbal attack on another student or the instructor, regarding their positions, politics, backgrounds, etc is strictly prohibited. This firmly falls under the Anti-Harassment policy maintained by the college even though the class is online.

Every other week, a discussion topic pertaining to that week's reading assignment is posted. Each student must **post an initial blog-length response by midnight of Tuesday to the discussion question**. To facilitate discussion and learning environment online, students will come back later in the week (after 8 am Wednesday of the *same* week and **no later than midnight Saturday of that week**) and respond to at least 2 other student's initial responses.

In order to ensure students are logging on at least twice a week, you may not comment to other students **BEFORE 8 am Wednesday**, to allow each student to get their initial response submitted for peer comments/responses.

Initial posts must be a minimum of 800-1000 words. These must be spell and grammar checked for readability (so please type in some word processing application and then copy and paste to the Discussion Board before posting). Peer comments should be a minimum of 350 words and also grammar and spell checked. Each initial post is worth 30 points, and each peer response is worth 10 points each, for a weekly total of 50 points per discussion board. As blogs require substantive research, students are expected to spend time conducting external research on the topic (outside of the textbook information!) and utilizing appropriate sources and citations. As such, there will not be any additional assignments allocated to those weeks to ensure students have sufficient time to properly research and answer the blog questions.

Assessments: All quizzes are found under the weekly folders in D2L. Students will take all quizzes online. There are a total of 6 quizzes, each worth 20 points, for a total of 120 points. Online quizzes are assumed to be open book, open notes. These are timed quizzes, and students should prepare for these assessments as if you were taking the quiz in a classroom without notes. Each quiz will be comprised of multiple choice questions. Students will have <u>50</u> minutes to complete the test, and may take the test only <u>once</u>. After

50 minutes, the quiz will time out. Timed out quizzes close resulting in a zero grade. As such, it is imperative that students have a secure and reliable internet connection, and must complete the test within one sitting.

Within 24 hours after an assessment is due, each student must log in as well as check their email for communication from the instructor. While tests will not be graded yet, it is imperative you check to see if there is any communication regarding any problem with your exam submitting properly. If there is a problem with the instructor being able to access your exam, an email communication will be sent to you within 24 hours, asking that you resubmit the exam again for testing. If there is a problem and an exam needs to be resubmitted, the deadline for re-submitting is typically within a 24-36 hour time frame, so it is very important students follow up within the 24 hour period laid out in the syllabus. STUDENTS WHO FAIL TO CHECK THEIR EMAIL AND THE PORTALS WITHIN THE 24 HOUR DEADLINE, AND SO MISS THE DEADLINE FOR RE-SUBMISSION WILL NOT BE GIVEN ADDITIONAL TIME NOR HAVE A CHANCE TO RESUBMIT THEIR TEST. THEY WILL BE GIVEN A ZERO FOR THE QUIZ EVEN THOUGH YOU TOOK IT WITHIN THE ORIGINAL DEADLINE...THIS IS NON-NEGOTIABLE.

Exams: Students will complete a midterm and final exam. Midterms will include all materials provided until week 9, including textbook and lecture materials. The final exam will cover all materials of the second half of the semester, including textbook and lecture materials. All exams are conducted online, unless students make alternative arrangements with the instructor. Exams will be made available the first day of the week they are assigned. Deadlines are listed in the course schedule and students should take care to complete and submit exams before the deadline. Deadline extensions are generally not possible.

Incomplete Grades: An incomplete grade (I) is generally not an option in this course. Only on rare occasions will the instructor consider awarding an incomplete grade for cases of serious illness with doctor verification, or other extreme emergencies.

The syllabus may be modified by the instructor at any time. All students are advised to refer to their syllabus regularly throughout the semester
